## The Dark Side of the Screen

The internet continues to influence and enhance many aspects of our daily life. However, there is a growing recognition that the technology which improves our living standards can also provide an opportunity to amplify negative behaviours online. Cyber bullying on social media has emerged as a growing widespread problem due to increased likelihood of encountering strangers online. Several factors appear to contribute to the prevalence of cyberbullying on social media including anonymity, easy access to technology and the inadequate awareness of the consequences of online behaviour.

Research consistently identifies the consequences of bullying for emotional health of children and young people. Victims experience a lack of acceptance in their peer group which also increases loneliness and social isolation. It is likely to lead to low self-esteem and depression. Victims often feel ashamed, nervous, insecure, worried and turn to substance abuse or self-harm or even more severe steps. Health issues like frequent headaches, nausea and stomach aches are also frequently observed.

The most fundamental way of dealing with cyber bullying is to attempt to prevent in the first place through e- safety policies. Schools and parents now work towards spreading awareness about it in young minds. New policies regarding safety must be formed and implemented effectively.

## THE NIGHT A VOICE STOLE OUR SAVINGS - AND WHAT IT TAUGHT US ABOUT CYBER SECURITY

That was the night a single phone call almost cost us a significant portion of our hard-earned savings - and taught us more about cyber security than any textbook ever could.

The call came to my father. The man on the other end introduced himself as someone my father had known for years.

He said he urgently needed money for his child's medical treatment. He sounded distressed but dignified -He asked my father to transfer money through a QR code and promised to return it soon.

A substantial amount - transferred within minutes.

The scammer exploited three powerful psychological triggers:

Trust & Familiarity, Emotional Urgency, Mental Fatigue

The turning point came unexpectedly. My mother jokingly said, "What if you've been defrauded?"

It was a joke - but it planted doubt.

My father immediately called the real number saved in his phone. The actual person denied asking for money. A cold realization spread through the room. When my father called the unknown number back and questioned him directly, the line went silent. Then it was switched off.

We immediately: Called the national cybercrime helpline. Reported the transaction on the official cybercrime portal. Contacted the bank and UPI/payment platform. Preserved all evidence - call recordings, screenshots, QR codes, transaction IDs. Filed a formal written complaint at the cybercrime office.

Because we reported the fraud immediately - within hours - authorities were able to freeze the recipient accounts before the money was fully withdrawn or layered into other accounts. After procedures, verification, and legal processing, the entire amount was credited back to us.

That night changed the way I see cyber security. It is not just about strong passwords or antivirus software. It is about awareness, verification, and emotional control.

Cyber criminals are evolving. They no longer break doors - they walk in through trust.

We were lucky - but more than luck, we were fast.

The biggest myth in cyber fraud is that "nothing can be done."

That night proved otherwise.

# The Digital Trap: From Screen Time to Cybercrime

Nowadays, children are increasingly attracted to mobile phones. They remain constantly engaged in playing games or watching videos. This attachment leads to excessive screen time, and children may become addicted to the digital world. As a result, they become vulnerable online and easy targets for scammers - the digital strangers of our time.

These scammers create fake profiles and promise fake rewards or prizes. They pretend to be close friends to trick children into revealing personal details. Eventually, this information may be used for blackmail.

To understand the danger, consider the case of a 14-year-old boy addicted to an online game. One evening, a "new friend" promised him a reward. Getting excited, the boy didn't hesitate when asked for verification. He shared his mother's bank details and an OTP from her phone. Within 15 minutes, ₹1.5 lakh was stolen from his family's savings. What began as a simple hour of screen time ended in a crime where the child was deceived and the family's privacy was violated.

To break this cycle, parents must move from being passive users to active digital guardians. They must ensure that their children are more connected to real-world safety than to digital screens.

Understanding how our habits affect online safety, I think has to be the first step towards becoming more secure in the digital world!



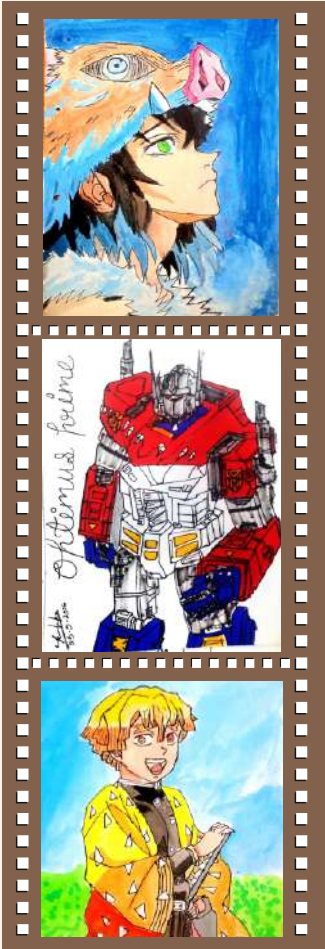

# BEYOND THE CANVAS

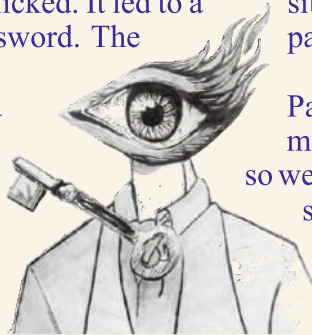
